



Modern Slavery & Human Trafficking Policy

Approach

The Delivery Authority employs a risk-based approach to identifying and managing modern slavery risks in its supply chain, in line with the recommended approach set out in [PPN 009: Tackling modern slavery in government supply chains](#). It is committed to acting transparently in all matters related to modern slavery and human trafficking and tackling any identified instances of it in its supply chain.

Supply Chain

The Delivery Authority requires all organisations with whom it is engaged to fully comply with the Modern Slavery Act 2015, operate to the highest level of ethical standards and hold their own suppliers to the same high standards.

Awareness and training

The Delivery Authority requires that all staff upon joining undertake Modern Slavery Awareness training. Commercial team staff, responsible for letting and management contracts, receive additional training annually which focuses on mitigating the risk of modern slavery in commercial activity. All such training is reviewed annually by the Head of Procurement Processes & Assurance to ensure it remains fit for purpose.
